INTRODUCTION

This handbook will take you through the process of completing an application to University in the UK.

The **Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS)** is a centralised organisation whose main role is to operate the application process for British universities. You will complete **one online application form** which allows you to apply for **up to 5 different universities or courses**. Each university will receive a copy of your application but they will not see where else you have applied and your choices will automatically be listed alphabetically, not in order of preference.

Your tutor and the rest of the Sixth Form team are here to advise and guide you through the process of researching, deciding and applying for whichever course is best for you.

UCAS applications take a long time to complete - for you and for us! There is an intentionally long gap between the internal and external deadlines, as there are many things which staff need to check before a student's application can be submitted to UCAS. This might include chasing references (and waiting for other staff to reply), checking qualifications and choices, and reviewing personal statements. Therefore the earlier you complete your application, the better. Not only does this give us ample time to check and submit your application to UCAS, but it also maximises your chances of getting offers quickly as the majority of applications will hit the University admissions teams in January when they will have many 1000s to plough through!

Foundation Degree	A 2 year standalone degree , usually in a vocational subject. Qualification achieved: FdA/FdSc (Foundation Degree Arts or Science) You may have the option to do a 'top-up year' afterwards to achieve an Honours (full) degree. Lower entry requirements.	2 years Point of entry: year 1
Single Honours	You graduate in one subject, becoming specialised and acquiring depth and breadth in your chosen subject Qualification achieved depends on your subject: BA (Bachelor of Arts) BSc (Bachelor of Science) BEng (Bachelor of Engineering) LLB (Bachelor of Law)	3 years Point of entry: year 1

APPLICATION FAQs

1. What is the buzzword, and why do I need it?	Our UCAS buzzword for 2023 entry is Angmering2023 Using this will link your application to the Sixth Form, and allow us to track and support your application, and easily add your reference.
2. Do I just get one attempt at this?	No - you can edit, update and save your UCAS application as many times as you like, before submission. Do not complete the Pay & Send section until your application has been checked by Emily and she has given you the go-ahead to submit.
3. What happens when it's ready to send?	When you've completed and paid for your application and submitted it, it only comes to us in the Sixth Form , not to UCAS.
4. Why doesn't it go straight to UCAS, and why do you need it so early?	We need at least two weeks to double check, add the reference and predicted grades and approve your application before we finally submit it to UCAS.
5. Where can I go for help?	The Sixth Form Team is here to help you every step of the way with resources and advice: contact your tutor, subject teachers, Tony or Emily if you have any questions, but also check the UCAS and university websites, and google classrooms for further information.

FILLING IN YOUR APPLICATION FORM

First, you need to register in the UCAS Hub

- Make a note of your username and password, it will not be displayed again and you will need it to log in.
- Use your **personal email address**, not your school one
- Select year of entry (**2023**)
- Level of study - **Undergraduate**
- Preferences - tick all that apply
- 'Are you applying from a school?' Choose **Yes**, add **The Angmering School and the buzzword Angmering2023**
- Select your tutor group
- You'll then be taken to your UCAS Hub dashboard, where you'll see a tile called 'Your application'. Simply click 'Start' to begin your application.
- **2023 entry applications**: You can register and start your application for 2023 now, although you cannot submit it to UCAS until 6 September 2022.

You can now complete the 'Your Profile' Section.

Personal Details

Make sure you enter your name exactly as stated on official documents, such as your passport, birth certificate, or driving licence.

The name with which you are entered for exams is the one that links to your application and on results day the universities will need to be able to match your results with your application, so **do not use a different name or an abbreviated version on your application form as it may cause issues on results day** when your place will be confirmed as soon as results are published.

Contact and Residency

Use your **personal email address**, not your school one

Nominated access: it is useful to add parent/carer here as a person that UCAS can contact if necessary in your absence.

Area of permanent residence: choose **West Sussex** from the drop-down

Residential Category: **UK Citizen - England**

Education

It is important to complete this fully and accurately.

Add place of Education... e.g. Angmering School, Littlehampton

Exam Centre Number: 65301

Start date (for most current Yr 12) 09 2016.... End date 07 2023

Type of study: full time

Do you or will you have any qualifications from this centre? Yes

Now list your qualifications. Start with your GCSEs, then add A levels/Level 3.

For each qualification you need to click 'Add a qualification' and then find your qualification from the menu.

GCSEs - choose GCSE (Grade 9-1) It is helpful to have your GCSE certificates to hand for this section as you need to enter the exam board (awarding organisation). *If you can't find your original exam notification, ask Pauline for a printout from SIMS - this contains all the information you need, including the exam boards.*

You must include all the qualifications that you have taken since Year 11, with grades, even if you have a U grade for anything. If you have retaken a GCSE in Year 12 then list it twice with the correct dates.

Click 'save and add another' when listing similar qualifications.

A Levels: choose GCE Advanced Level (A Level) and enter the subject. Grade - put pending if you have not yet achieved the qualification and Qualification Date - August 2023

Level 3 CamTech/BTEC - make sure you enter these carefully - see list below.

- If you are taking a BTEC you will need to add your BTEC registration number - see Pauline or Emily for this.
- If you are taking a BTEC or CamTech you will need to **list the modules** you are studying - your teachers will be able to give you a list of modules covered in your course if you are not sure, and they may also be on your Google Classroom for the course.

How to enter your vocational qualification correctly

Health & Social Care (double)

Choose the button from the Qualifications Shortlist '**+ OCR Level 3 Cambridge Technical Diploma**' - type 'Health and Social Care' in the Subject box. List your modules.

BTECs

Scroll down to 'Search for your qualifications' and type '**Pearson BTEC Level 3 National**' in the box.

A list of options will appear below.

Choose the correct version for your course as follows:

- **BTEC Human Biology** - Choose **Extended Cert RQF (360) (2016 to Present)** - type **Applied Human Biology** in the 'Title' box
- **BTEC Sport Science** - Choose **Extended Cert RQF (360) (2016 to Present)** - type **Sport and Exercise Science** in the 'Title' box
- **BTEC Sport (triple)** - Choose **Extended Diploma RQF (1080) (2016 to Present)** - type **Sport** in the Title box

If you are doing a different sized Sport qualification by special arrangement (eg a single or double Sport) then check with your teacher which option to choose i.e. Certificate/Extended Cert/Diploma.

Add your modules for the course with any grades already achieved in Year 12 and 'pending' for the units you are taking in year 13. Your overall grade will be 'Pending'.

Employment

Click Add Employment and fill in the boxes

Nationality

For most students:

Country of birth - United Kingdom

Nationality - UK National

Supporting Information

Include as much information as you can about any difficulties you have such as mental health issues, dyslexia as well as any disabilities, as you may be eligible for additional support.

Finance and Funding

Main source of funding - if you intend to apply for a Student Loan then choose 'UK, ChI, IoM or EU Student Finance Services'

Student support arrangements - choose West Sussex

Diversity and Inclusion

Fill in the boxes for the top section.

Under 'Activities in preparation for higher education' - include summer schools, taster courses and any online activities you have done. No need to include general open days.

YOUR PERSONAL STATEMENT

Click on the link in this section of the application form for tips and advice, which includes a worksheet to help you structure your personal statement if you want to use it. However there is a writing frame on Unifrog too.

- 4000 characters (47 lines) - about one side of A4 in 12 point
- Formal written evidence of your desire to study a particular subject: opportunity to sell yourself, and support your application. Time to show off!
- Extracurricular content is key: reflect on things you have done (or are planning to do) that you didn't have to do, which prove your interest in your chosen subject; or which demonstrate relevant transferable skills or qualities (eg, work experience, volunteering, wider reading or other research)
- Well-structured, clearly expressed and reflective: not a story with a plot, but a series of expanded, connected statements
- One statement for all choices: do not try to apply for wildly different courses such as Drama and Maths in one application
- Use your own words: UCAS and universities use software to detect plagiarism. Further, don't make statements that you can't justify or expand upon if called to interview

Please write your personal statement on Unifrog so that your tutor can see it and give you feedback online.

Do not paste the statement into the application form until it has been approved (show it to your tutor, relevant subject teacher and Emily, and act on their feedback).

YOUR CHOICES

This will need careful consideration and research so take your time!

Things to consider:	Questions to ask yourself:

Just because they have the same name, it doesn't mean they contain the same modules. ● How is it taught? How much contact time will you get?

1. You may choose a maximum of five courses (but only four for Medicine, Dentistry, or Veterinary Science). Generally we recommend you use all five choices, but this doesn't work for everyone. If you initially choose fewer than five courses, you can add more later.
2. You can choose more than one course from a single university, but these should be in related subjects: eg, Geography, and Geography with International Relations. You can only write **one personal statement**, which goes to all universities, so it will need to be subject specific.
3. Choose courses which are within the range of your predicted grades: making shortlists on Unifrog www.unifrog.com will help you sort your choices into "aspirational", "solid" and "safe".
4. Check on the need for Admissions Tests for individual universities and courses (particularly Medicine) and make sure you register before the deadlines.
5. Your choices will arrange themselves on your form in alphabetical order: you cannot indicate a preference.
6. We strongly advise you not to apply for any university that you have not visited (or at least done a virtual tour). Open days are a priority over the summer, and you will have further opportunities in the Autumn Term. Most universities also offer applicant days (tasters) when they make an offer.
7. Point of entry - normally this will be Year 1 but if you are applying for a degree with a foundation year it will be Year 0.
8. Start date will normally be Sept 2023 but if you plan to take a gap year then choose 2024 and it will automatically select 'deferred entry'.

REFERENCES, PREDICTED GRADES AND FINAL STEPS

- Your tutor will write your overall reference, which goes to UCAS, based on the references written by your subject teachers. These are collected on the teachers' section of Unifrog, and will include your predicted grades.
- The reference should give a holistic view: your tutor should know you better than anyone, and can give fully rounded support of your application. It's particularly helpful if you have discussed your personal statement with your tutor, so that they can refer to this in your reference. Make sure your tutor is aware of any factors that may have affected your progress at college e.g. health issues, personal circumstances, so that they can reflect on these in the reference (for example, stating that despite some health issues you have worked hard to achieve your potential).
- Once you have completed all your parts of the application, paid and sent, it will come to us. We will double check all parts of the application, and if there are any issues or queries, we can send it back to you for amending. **You will not have to pay again.**
- We then add the reference and predicted grades, and Mr Kerrison will give final approval before submitting it to UCAS. You will be notified in Track that your application has been received by UCAS.
- Now sit back and wait for the offers to roll in!
